OVERVIEW

Highlights from the draft OCP include:

- No change to Urban Containment Boundary (UCB)
- Increased housing density city-wide
- Downtown is the heart of the community
- Protection of farm lands
- Support for active transportation

- New policy on:

 - o Climate change
 - o Transit planning
 - Economic development
 - \circ Food security

FIRST NATIONS

- New First Nations section (<u>page 8</u>), but at present contains no policy provisions.
- First Nations objectives are:
 - To advance Truth and Reconciliation
 - To strengthen relationships
 - To honour First Nations knowledge

- To work together to address issues
- To ensure that First Nations peoples see themselves reflected in the community
- **GROWTH MANAGEMENT & RESIDENTIAL**
- No significant changes are proposed to the Urban Containment Boundary (<u>UCB map</u>)
- Continues to focus on growth within the UCB
- Increase in residential densities across the community in response to Provincial legislation. Three- and four-unit homes, duplexes, secondary suites, and accessory dwellings are now permitted in medium-density areas

- The ALR "island" is withdrawn from consideration for ALR exclusion. It is now only possible for that process to start once substantial parts of Areas A & B are developed (page 12)
- New policies that seek to address affordability (Policies 11, 12 & 13 on page 16)
- Specific policy directing a rezoning of the high density residential area (Policy 5 on page 17)
- New Infill Residential Development Permit Area Guidelines are created (page 68)
- Mixed-use developments and small-scale commercial uses are encouraged in residential areas (page 12, page 16, page 18)
- List of neighbourhood plans that will need to be undertaken (page 14)

RURAL & AGRICULTURE

- Limits future Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) exclusions to one priority area (page 22, Map C)
- New specific subsection addressing Food Security issues (<u>page 23</u>)
- Introduces a new Farm Protection Development Permit Area (page 117)

COMMERCIAL, INDUSTRY & ECONOMY

- Ensures downtown remains the heart of the community
- New section (page 49) dedicated to economic development
- Protects industrial areas from residential development (page 30)
- New policy section on the industrial expansion area north of the airport (page 31).

ENVIRONMENT & CLIMATE CHANGE

- New climate change policy section to direct both mitigation and adaptation (page 34)
- Greenhouse gas emissions reduction targets align with the IPCC emissions targets to limit warming to 2.0°C (not 1.5°C) (page 36)

PARKS & RECREATION & GREENWAYS

• Provides direction to improve recreation facilities by strengthening asset management and facility maintenance planning (<u>page 37</u>).

ARTS, CULTURE, HERITAGE & COMMUNITY,

- Policies seek to strengthen partnerships to address complex social issues
- Dedicated Community and Social Services policy section (page 45)
- Outlines the City's role in social development (Policy 6, page 47)

TRANSPORTATION & INFRASTRUCTURE

- Continues to support a variety of efficient and safe transportation options
- Supports implementation of the City's existing Active Transportation Plan (page 52)
- Supports improving maintenance of active transportation infrastructure (page 52)
- Policies aim to improve and expand the transit route network and frequency (page 53)
- Introduces advance road plans and policies (Policies 5 and 6, Page 54) (Map L)
- Encourages opportunities for green infrastructure (page 60)
- Provides more direction on solid waste programs (<u>page 61</u>).

POTENTIAL HAZARD AREAS

- Proposes a Development Permit Area and guidelines for areas of wildfire risk (page 62)
- Outlines several emergency preparedness and response plans to be developed (page 63)

IMPLEMENTATION / PRIORITIES

- An Implementation section is included, starting on <u>page 65</u>. This includes a one-page implementation priority list over the next 5 years (<u>page 69</u>)
 - The public engagement process indicated the following sentiment regarding order of priorities:
 - 1. New and/or improved recreational facilities
 - 2. Active transportation improvements
 - 3. Transit improvements
 - 4. Emissions reductions / climate change programs
